Saint Teresa Parish Statement of Mission

Through our Baptism and Sacramental Life as Roman Catholics, we become a part of the Body of Christ. Guided by St. Teresa, our patron, and the Communion of Saints, we aspire to be living witnesses of the Gospel by loving and serving one another and reaching out to all others with the Love of Christ.

Our Parish History

St. Teresa Parish was founded in 1926 by the Most Reverend Henry Althoff, Bishop of Belleville. The parish was formed out of the existing parishes of the Cathedral of St. Peter and St. Luke, and put under the protection of St. Teresa of the Child Jesus—also known as “The Little Flower.”

The first pastor, Rev. William Hoff, arrived in Belleville on January 7, 1926, and temporarily took up residence at the Cathedral. Shortly thereafter, that initial “parish family,” which consisted of approximately 120 families of German-American descent, purchased two homes on property located in the 1100 block of Lebanon Avenue. One would be used for a rectory and the other for a convent. They also decided to build a church and a school on the property. The church and school were dedicated on August 29, 1926, and the school opened on September 7th with an enrollment of 135 pupils. The School Sisters of Notre Dame took up residence in the parish on September 21, 1926. To accomplish all of this in one year was quite a feat for such a small number of households.

By 1950 the parish had grown to nearly 500 families, and there was need for additional educational space. On May 28, 1951 ground was broken for a new school, which was dedicated by the Most Reverend Albert R. Zuroweste on September 7, 1952.

With the death of Msgr. Hoff on June 1, 1955, Msgr. Joseph Stenger was appointed the second pastor of St. Teresa’s on August 1, 1955. Perhaps most significant under his leadership was the purchase of the Star-Peerless Brewery property for \$54,000 in 1958, which ultimately became the site of the present-day church and rectory. Ground was broken for this construction project on January 3, 1965, and dedication ceremonies were held on May 7, 1967.

Msgr. Stenger’s unexpected death occurred in September, 1971, and Msgr. Laurence J. O’Connell succeeded him. Even though the pastorate of Msgr. O’Connell was extremely short, having passed away on March 19, 1975, his life-long interest in education was instrumental in providing a much needed library for the school.

Msgr. Cletus Cunningham served as the fourth pastor of St. Teresa Parish. He was appointed in 1975 and served until 1982. The responsibility of providing educational and growth opportunities for the whole child was enhanced during his pastorate with the purchase of additional frontage property adjoining the school grounds on Church Street, and the subsequent building of a gymnasium, several classrooms and a fully-equipped kitchen.

Fr. Robert Dollar followed Msgr. Cunningham as pastor. He continued the implementation of church reform mandated by the Second Vatican Council. The beauty of our parish grounds was enhanced by undertaking a major landscaping project, as well as the erection of an informational sign at the entrance of the church property. Again, property was purchased on Lebanon Avenue for expansion of the school playground area.

In July, 1991, the parish fully realized the national shortage of religious vocations, when the School Sisters of Notre Dame ceased their presence in the staffing of our parish school.

Fr. Louis Peterson became the sixth pastor of St. Teresa Parish on June 24, 1991. The parish, now the second largest in the Diocese of Belleville had a membership of over 1,450 households. The school had an enrollment of 298 children in Kindergarten through Eighth Grade, while 192 children were enrolled in the Parish School of Religion. Fr. Peterson was granted a leave of absence in January of 1994.

Several priests served as Administrators from January until the end of June, 1994.

Fr. Donald W. Eichenseer served as parish administrator from July of 1994 until he was named the seventh pastor of the parish in November of 1995. In May of 2000, Fr. Eichenseer was recommended, by Bishop Wilton D. Gregory to be named a “Prelate of Honor of His Holiness” and given the title “Monsignor.” Under his leadership a new addition to the school was completed in July of 2000 providing a parish meeting area, eight classrooms, an elevator, handicapped accessibility and additional parking.

Fr. John L. Venegoni, was appointed the eighth pastor of St. Teresa Parish by Bishop Wilton Gregory on September 2, 2003. Fr. Venegoni restructured the Pastoral Council, greatly reduced the parish debt owed on the new addition, improved the lighting around the grounds, and installed air-conditioning to seven of the original classrooms. Fr. Venegoni was granted a medical leave of absence in July of 2007 and passed away October 11, 2007.

The current pastor, Fr. David Darin, was appointed the ninth pastor of St. Teresa’s by Bishop Edward K. Braxton on July 10, 2007. In April of 2012, Fr. Darin was recommended, by Bishop Edward K. Braxton, to be named a “Chaplain to His Holiness” and given the title “Monsignor.”



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St. Teresa

Teresa was born January 2, 1873, at Alencon, France, and was baptized January 4, 1873, just two days later. Her first Holy Communion was made on May 8, 1884, and she was confirmed June 14, 1884.

She was the youngest of nine children. However, only five of these children survived infancy. Her parents were Mr. and Mrs. Louis Martin. Mr. Martin was a jeweler and watchmaker and Mrs. Martin a devoted mother. Both were outstanding examples of ideal parents since they were deeply pious and upright Catholics. The atmosphere of their home was so permeated with kindness and love that Teresa relates that it often reminded her of what heaven would be like. What an example for mothers and fathers to emulate! These loving parents were ultimately the prime influence and inspiration of their children's lives.

Mrs. Martin died of cancer when Teresa was only four and one half years old. Her grief knew no bounds at the loss of her beloved mother. At this time her oldest sister, Pauline, took over the management of the affairs of the household. Since Teresa was a very affectionate child she soon became attached to Pauline and referred to her as her "second mother." Thus, when Pauline entered Carmel, Teresa, who was about ten years old, could hardly bear the pain of another major separation in her life. Then Teresa developed a serious and mysterious disease. She seemed incurable and at the point of death. Nonetheless, she assured her anxious father that she would be well for the day of Pauline's Investiture at Carmel. During the time of her illness, Teresa prayed even more fervently to our heavenly Mother. A statue of Our Lady was always in her bedroom. The day of Pauline's Investiture, Teresa was present, well and overjoyed. Subsequently, Louise and Celine followed Pauline into Carmel while Leonie entered the Order of the Visitation. It is interesting to note that Celine, Sister Genevieve, lived until 1956.

Teresa had a burning desire to enter Carmel and there to pray, sacrifice and do penance for souls. She thought that by entering the cloister and leading a contemplative life while praying and sacrificing for missionaries, she could do more for the mission work of the Church than by actually becoming a missionary and working only one isolated area of the missions. But the entrance age was sixteen and she was only fourteen. Therefore, she resolved to ask the Holy Father himself if he might allow her the special favor of entering Carmel before she had reached her sixteenth birthday. As a member of a French pilgrimage, the "Little Queen" and her father visited Rome on November 20, 1887, on the occasion of the sacerdotal jubilee of Pope Leo XIII. As he approached her in private audience, Teresa boldly asked the Holy Father: "In honor of your jubilee, allow me to enter Carmel at fifteen." "You shall enter if it be God's will," the Holy Father replied.

At the end of that same year, the Bishop of the diocese gave her permission to enter Carmel even though he had previously denied her petition. On April 9, 1888, the long awaited day arrived—Teresa entered the Carmel of Lisieux. Her life as a member of the Order of Carmel was not characterized by any unusual events. She resolved to do the ordinary things in an extraordinary way for the love of God, for souls and especially for priests and missionaries. Teresa did not miss the least opportunity to offer even the smallest acts to God through love. She remarked on one occasion: “I am a very little Soul, who can only offer very little things to Our Lord.” Thus she became known as the saint of the “Little Way.” Yet, St. Teresa knew that each person must depend upon God.

Teresa was appointed assistant to the Novice Mistress when she was twenty years old. Later, it was discovered that she was suffering from tuberculosis. After weeks of excruciating suffering and agony, she died at the age of 24, on September 30, 1897, repeating: “Oh! I love Him!...My God, I love You!” Her life was short and simple, but full of courage, love and generosity.

Our Saint had promised while she was alive to “spend my heaven doing good upon earth,” and to send forth a “shower of roses.” How well she kept her promises can be attested to by the numerous miracles that have been performed through her intercession.

Teresa was beatified by Pope Pius XI on April 29, 1923, and on May 17, 1925, the same Pope, in a formal solemn canonization ceremony, proclaimed her a Saint of God. In May of 1927 she was named the Patroness of all Foreign Missions. She also has been proclaimed one of the patronesses of France. And less than seven months after her canonization, this parish was established and named in honor of Saint Teresa.

EXTRA-ORDINARY MINISTERS OF HOLY COMMUNION - Serve the gathered assembly by distributing the Body and Blood of Christ during the celebration of the Eucharist. GIFT BEARERS (Newly Reorganized!) - We have always had individuals or families to present the bread and wine at Mass, but we are taking it to the next level. Parents and kids together, even with grandparents or other family members, can be scheduled for each weekend Mass to present the bread and wine at the Preparation of the Gifts. Two people will carry the gifts, but your whole family can walk together in the procession. As one of our simplest roles, this is a great way to involve younger children in a liturgical ministry! NOVENA TO ST. TERESA THE LITTLE FLOWER - The Novena to our patron, St. Teresa of the Child Jesus and the Holy Face, is held immediately following the 8:15 am Mass on the First Monday of every month.

OUTDOOR GREETERS (NEW!) - Open to individuals, couples, or whole families. While our Ushers focus on welcoming and serving people inside the church, our Outdoor Greeters will extend that feeling of welcome outside of the church building. Your ministry is to stand outside our front or side entrances, greet everyone with a warm smile and good morning!, and open the door for every person as they enter. This ministry goes on rain or shine, hot or cold, so dress accordingly. This is a great way for families to serve together. You can build up our faith community while building up your arm muscles as you open that door for everyone! USHERS AND USHER FAMILIES (Newly Expanded!) - Open to individuals, couples, or whole families. These are the primary ministers who welcome guests and visitors to our church and serve the needs of the assembly. Parents and kids together can share the tasks of preparing your assigned entrance and section of pews before Mass, greeting people as they arrive, taking up the collection, helping with the Communion procession, passing out bulletins at the end of Mass, and getting your assigned area ready for the next celebration. Music

SATURDAY CHOIR - This choir sings weekly throughout the year at the 5:00 Saturday Mass. This group focuses on contemporary songs along with some traditional chants and hymns. SUNDAY CHOIR - This choir sings at the 9:00 Sunday Mass on the first, third and fifth Sundays, the 11:00 Sunday Mass on the second and fourth Sundays and for some feast days September through June. In addition to its primary role of leading the assembly in sung prayer, this group also sings choral anthems as an offering to God and for prayerful contemplation by the assembly. Membership: open to 7th grade students through adult, call to discuss placement. Skill Level: ability to read music is a plus but not required. Rehearsal: Wednesdays 7:00-8:30 pm. Commitment: regular attendance is ideal. Contact: Scott Pluff

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CANTORS - Cantors lead the assembly in sung prayer for parish Masses as well as for weddings, funerals, and other communal celebrations. Membership: open to 7th grade students through adult, call to schedule audition. Skill Level: basic ability to read music is required, along with ability to prepare music in advance. Rehearsal: individually as needed plus occasional group rehearsals. Commitment: scheduling is flexible. Contact: Scott Pluff

YOUTH CHOIR - This choir sings at the 11:00 Mass on the first Sunday of each month during the school year, for the all-school Masses on Wednesday mornings. Through this experience, children are exposed to a wide range of liturgical music and are prepared to graduate into our parish's adult choirs. Membership: open to all students in grades 4 - 8 whether they attend St. Teresa School or any other public or private school. Commitment: regular attendance is encouraged, but scheduling is flexible. Parish Life

BEREAVEMENT MINISTRY - An apostolate of Senior Adult Ministry at St. Teresa, the bereavement ministry seeks to comfort the individual parishioner who has lost a spouse or other loved one. FINANCE COUNCIL - Finance Council includes the president of the pastoral council, two trustees, three representatives, school board representative, business manager, accountant and the pastor. A parish advisory group who assists the pastor in setting the budget and in administering the parish finances.

FUNERAL LUNCHEONS - As needed to prepare funeral luncheons for parishioners. Contact Marilyn Fiedler at 234-5876.

HEALTH MINISTRY - Do you work in some aspect of the health field? Are you a doctor, nurse, dietician, or have some other gift you can share with our parish? St. Teresa Health Ministry just may be for you! Our meetings are usually less than 1 hour, and we try to meet quarterly. Due to legal reasons, we cannot visit parishioners at home as part of our ministry. Instead, we have an annual health fair (held in October). LEGION OF MARY - Legion of Mary is a world-wide organization of Catholics, men and women, who offer their services to their pastor for apostolic work in the parish. Members also assist in the distribution of meals via St. Vincent de Paul bus in the E. St. Louis area once monthly. Sacraments

PRECANA - As part of the requirements prior to marriage, following diocesan guidelines for marriage preparation, a Precana program is offered through the Metro East Vicariate. Contact the rectory at 233-3500.

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS-RCIA - If an adult wishes to join the Catholic Church, he or she is invited to participate in the RCIA Program. The RCIA sessions are currently held on Sunday mornings. The sessions focus on understanding how faith works in our lives, and how we can express it in our own personal prayer life and in the celebration of the sacraments. Various stages of the process are marked by liturgical celebrations during the Sunday Liturgy. The program culminates at the Easter Vigil, when an individual is baptized (if he or she has never been baptized) or makes a profession of faith (if they have been baptized in another religion), is Confirmed, and receives the Eucharist for the first time in the Catholic Church. This program includes Catechists, and Sponsors as well as those interested in the Catholic Faith. School

ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION - St. Teresa Athletic Program is to provide an environment where students can develop individual skill, positive attitudes toward themselves and their team, and good sportsmanship toward fellow participants and opposing teams. HIGH SCHOOL-CATHOLIC - Althoff Catholic High School is located at 5401 West Main Street, Belleville, IL. PARENT TEACHER ORGANIZATION - The St. Teresa Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) was formed in 1990. Objectives:

1. To foster communication and cooperation between family and the school.
2. To develop united efforts in the interest of the physical, mental, social, intellectual and spiritual education of every child.
3. To promote the welfare of children in homes, church and community and create a greater appreciation of Catholic education.
4. To fulfill these objectives through conference, committees, projects and fundraising activities.
5. To provide a labor pool of volunteers to assist at school.

The PTO meetings are held on the fourth Monday of August, November, February, and May at 7:00 pm in the parish center. Membership is open to any parent, faculty member or interested parishioner. Dues are \$1.00 per member per year. PTO provides services for parents, teachers, students and school. SCHOOL BOARD OF EDUCATION - This board shall formulate policies for Catholic education in the parish. Since Catholic education is the legitimate exercise of the Church's right to teach, the Board shall be subject to the authority of the Church represented within the parish by the pastor. Except for this reservation, the Board shall maintain control over all aspects of Catholic education in the parish.

1. Voting members of the board shall consist of:
 - a. Nine lay men and/or women who are active parishioners excluding only those in direct paid employment by the parish or their immediate families. Members shall be elected by a lottery.
2. The Pastor/Administrator of the Parish will be an ex officio voting Member of the Board. The Principal of St. Teresa School will be an ex officio non-voting member of the Board.
3. The Business Manager, a representative of Mothers of Perpetual Help, St. Teresa Athletic Association (STAA), Extended Care, and the Parent-Teacher Organization (PTO), will be ex officio non-voting members of the Board.

The Board shall meet monthly at 7:00 pm on the third Tuesday of the month in the parish center. Special meetings may be called by the president as needed or by two members with the Pastor's approval.

SCHOOL ENDOWMENT - Give consideration to leaving a lasting memorial to the future education of youth as you plan your estate giving to charitable causes. Our Catholic Grade School has established an Endowment Fund. You are welcome to leave money, stocks, bonds, property and another financial means of support for continuing catholic education. Use of Parish Center, School Cafeteria and Gymnasium

GYM POLICY FOR ALL EVENTS

1. No one is permitted on the floor except team members, before, during and after games; (i.e., especially during half-time of games).
2. After any sporting event during which concessions are served, adult workers will be responsible for pushing the bleachers back and cleaning underneath and cleaning the gym floor.
3. Any organization serving food in the gym will be responsible for cleaning under the bleachers and cleaning the floor.
4. The maintenance person will check the gym after all events and if it has not been cleaned, will report it to the principal. The organization will be fined \$25.00. The principal will be in charge of collecting this fine. Any fines collected will be put in a parish maintenance fund.
5. During the school day, the use of the gym is subject to the direction of the PE. teacher.

USE OF THE SCHOOL GYM

1. Anyone not a parish or school team or organization will pay for the use of the school gym.
2. Teams or groups not sponsored by the parish will be charged \$20.00 per hour for use of the gym.
3. All schedules are subject to approval by the Athletic Director.
4. Use of equipment or supplies is subject to approval by the Athletic Director.
5. Groups from outside the parish must pay a deposit of \$25.00.
6. Rental money collected for gym use will be put into a parish maintenance fund.
7. All groups must be out of the gym by 10:00 pm unless the game runs into overtime.
8. Any scheduled events after 10:00 pm will require special permission from the pastor.
9. No smoking.
10. Adult supervision required for all gym use.
11. No roller blades, skateboards, hockey sticks, footballs or baseballs allowed.
12. All doors must be locked and lights turned off before leaving.
13. The gym will be closed for three weeks prior to the start of school.
14. A rental contract will be required from all groups not officially related to the school or the parish.

CAFETERIA POLICY FOR ALL EVENTS

1. A rental contract will be required from all groups not officially related to the school or parish.
2. All trash shall be put in outside dumpster.
3. Floor must be left clean and all tables and chairs replaced in their original position.
5. Building must be vacated by 10:00 pm, except by special consent of the pastor.
6. The cafeteria will be closed for three weeks prior to the start of school.
7. No smoking.

FEES FOR USE OF THE SCHOOL CAFETERIA

1. Fees for cafeteria: Parishioners \$100.00
2. Deposit of \$50.00 is required for clean-up. If cleaned to our satisfaction the deposit will be refunded.
3. Fees will be deposited into a parish maintenance fund.
4. Maximum capacity is 150 persons.

PARISH CENTER POLICY FOR ALL EVENTS

1. Parishioners of St. Teresa Parish may use the Parish Center. Parishioners are defined as those who are registered and participating.
2. St. Teresa facilities may not be used by outside groups for any fundraising activity.
3. St. Teresa facilities may not be used for any political meetings or rallies.
4. All individuals or groups using a parish facility must provide proof of insurance as indicated on Facility Use Agreement.
5. User is responsible for all damaged or broken property.
6. St. Teresa Parish is not responsible for user's damaged or broken property.
7. No alcohol may be sold on parish property by any outside group.
8. The parish is a not-for-profit organization under the Internal Revenue Code with limitations on any "for profit" activities. Consequently, use of parish facilities is limited to parish-sponsored organizations, parishioners of St. Teresa Parish, or outside groups comprised primarily of parish members or in which a parishioner is an officer or responsible person.
9. User fees are established to cover the estimated cost of lights, heat and other utilities and apply to all users except parish-sponsored organizations.
10. The dates for the major function must be cleared with the parish secretary at least two weeks prior to the event. The dates must be available.
11. Any function utilizing a band or D.J. must not play after 12:00 Midnight.
12. All functions shall conclude and all guests shall be gone from the premises no later than 1:00 am. Any hour or part of an hour past the 1:00 am deadline will be assessed a \$100 per hour charge.

13. Pictures, posters, decorations or other materials may not be attached to the walls, ceilings, windows, tables, doors or floors by nails, tacks, staples or other devices. Masking tape may be used on walls only. Ceiling decorations must be attached to hooks. No exposed candles, dark colored crepe paper, confetti, etc. shall be permitted.
14. Absolute limit the Parish Center will hold is 250 people.
15. Alcohol must be purchased through St. Teresa Parish.
16. Profane or abusive language, drunkenness, brawls, excessive noise or conduct is not acceptable at Catholic gatherings and at St. Teresa Parish and will not be tolerated at any time.
17. Rental is limited to adults 21 years of age or older. Persons under age 21 using the facilities must be supervised by an adult 21 years of age or older.
18. The parishioner renting, both individually and on behalf of the group represented, agrees to indemnify and reimburse St. Teresa for any damage to the Parish Center or other property of the church caused by anyone in attendance at the function.
19. The parishioner renting, both individually and on behalf of the group represented, agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless St. Teresa Parish, its employees, agents, and representatives, of and from any and all claims for injuries to anyone attending the function in question, whether said injuries are caused in whole or in part by the negligence of St. Teresa Parish, its agents, members or representatives.
20. EXCEPTIONS: Any exceptions or amendments to the above Guidelines must be made by St. Teresa Parish Council and/or parish pastor.
21. THIS IS A NO SMOKING FACILITY.

FEES FOR USE OF THE PARISH CENTER

1. Hall rental for showers, parties, etc., up to 100 people, is \$100.00. For 100 or more people present the hall rental is \$200.00. This is a four (4) hour rental. The bartender fee is \$20.00 per hour with a \$50.00 minimum. Check beer prices through the rectory.
2. Hall rental for Wedding Receptions is \$300.00. This is an eight (8) hour rental. The Bartender fee is \$20.00 per hour with a \$75.00 minimum. Check beer prices through the rectory. The renter may decorate the day of the wedding, or if available, the prior evening.
3. A deposit of \$50.00 is required for clean-up. If cleaned to our satisfaction the deposit will be returned.
4. Use of the warming kitchen is included but must be put back in the same condition as found as well as the entire Parish Center in order for the clean-up deposit to be returned.
